Course Overview and Objectives - The course approaches evaluation as an integral part of intervention, to be incorporated into all of its stages. Students will learn not only the technical aspects of evaluation, but how to conduct evaluations taking into account the environment in which the intervention is implemented. More specifically, the course has the following four objectives:

- 1) To raise awareness of the importance of evaluation, the context in which it is carried out, and how it can be incorporated into the different stages of intervention.
- 2) To increase awareness of the importance of planned, systematic, evidence-based intervention and to impart the knowledge and skills needed to implement it.
- To impart knowledge about different evaluation approaches and about different stages of evaluation.
- To impart knowledge and skills for performing different types of evaluation: Feasibility and Evaluability Assessment, Implementation and Process Evaluation, and Outcome Evaluation.

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Course requirements

1) Attendance and participation - Attendance is mandatory. Active involvement in class discussion is encouraged.

2) Reading - Below is a list of mandatory reading items for each topic covered in the course. All items appear either on the course's website or in one of the libraries at Tel Aviv University. Suggestions for additional reading are offered. Students are encouraged to broaden the scope of their reading based on their own personal and professional interests through relevant journals.

3) **Assignments** - Assignments for the course include one reading report and one final paper. All assignments should be handed <u>in print</u>, font size 12, double spaced, using acceptable APA formatting and referencing.

Reading report (due for lesson # 3)

Please read the following evaluation report which appears on the course website: <u>Porter, M. & Witham, P. (2003). "HAPPI" Evaluation report</u> - An evaluation of the centacare <u>homeless and parenting program initiative in south Australia.</u> (You may skip pages 21-32).

Answer the following questions, (up to 2 pages):

1. What were the main questions and goals of the evaluation?

2. What, in your opinion, were the main findings of the evaluation?

3. State any thoughts, reflections or reservations you have about the research described in the report.

Reports should be **<u>printed</u>** and handed in individually <u>by November 13, 2014</u>. No additional bibliography is required for this assignment.

Final paper

Your final paper will include writing a proposal of a program evaluation (the program can be one you have created, thought about or even executed. It can be a program that exists in an actual service or one that was written about in an article - please specify the source of your program). Write a paper that includes the following sections:

1. <u>Description of the intervention program</u> (the intervention must target a group or a community, but not an individual) – including general information about the program, the

organization in which it takes place, the needs that the program is supposed to meet, the target population, program's activities and planned outcomes.

2. <u>Theory of the problem and theory of the intervention</u> (theory of the problem refers to where this problem is believed to stem from; theory of the intervention refers to the assumptions that have led us to believe that this specific intervention will help with this problem).

3. Logic model of the program.

4. Evidence-Based Practice – specify <u>findings from evaluations</u> done on similar programs in Israel or abroad (if there weren't any evaluations of the exact same program, use findings from similar programs).

5. Program's proposed evaluation:

5.1 What will be <u>the tools or methods</u> used for measuring changes and reasons why you chose these tools or methods and not others? (include the full questionnaires or interview guides in the appendix)

5.2 What is the <u>proposed research design</u> (at what points will the measurement occur and through what ways).

6. <u>Summary</u>

6.1 <u>Summary</u> of the proposed evaluation.

6.2 <u>Personal summary</u> of the process of writing the proposed evaluation.

Base you paper on current academic literature (at least 5 literature items from the last 5 years, and another 5 from the last decade). Papers should not exceed 15 pages (double space, not including references). All papers should be in APA format.

The final assignment is an individual assignment.

The final assignment should be **printed** and handed in to Nilli's office by **February 26**,
